Many are the torments of the wicked, but steadfast love surrounds those who trust in the Lord.



+ GOSPEL Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32 The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the fifteenth chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So he told them this parable:

Then Jesus said, "There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands."' So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe-the best one-and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate. "Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.""



Call Committee Progress Report

The Call Committee had its third meeting on Tuesday, March 18th, to discuss roles, communication, and logistics. We set up a Google Drive for sharing information and discussed processes for conducting interviews and updating the congregation on our activities.

We also spent considerable time drafting preliminary interview questions for pastoral candidates. These questions cover areas around getting to know each candidate, what led them to ministry, their personal leadership style, strengths and weaknesses, etc., as well as questions designed to learn more about how they would interact with our congregation and help us achieve Oak Grove's mission.

Our next step will be a practice interview with Pastor Lee. We hope to receive a list of interview candidates from the ELCA sometime after Easter, at which point we will begin scheduling candidates for first-round interviews.

Transplaining: Faith and the Trans Experience in America

Hatred, discrimination and violence against certain groups of people have been on the rise during the last decade, and one of the key groups being targeted is the LGBTQ community – especially trans individuals. As Christians, we're called to "love our neighbor" without exception. To put a face on this issue and share information about the current state of discrimination the trans community is

facing, Oak Grove Lutheran Church is inviting India Miller, a transwoman and activist, to share her story on **Saturday**, **April 5**, **at 10:30 a.m.** India, born Jonathan, will explain how she came to realize her external identity didn't match who she was inside. She'll talk about the influence of religion on her journey, as well as the challenges she has encountered while trying to live authentically in a state and country that is openly hostile to trans individuals. With warmth and

humor, India will dispel some common myths about trans people and explain how you can help support this community as an ally. This presentation is free for attendees.
